TYPE in MOTION

Create compositions using type as image, incorporating a duration of time and adding sound to enhance the meaning of your intended communications. How can letterforms become characters, words, phrases, for you to animate? Enjoy the exploration of the characters, words, phrases as the parts of typeface design. Investigate how characters can move around, form groups and communicate with sound to tell a typographic story.

Deliverable

Produce a 30 second arrangement that is 640 [w] x 480 [h] pixels in size, with typographic form. The arrangement or animation will reveal the meaning of an assigned word and will tell a short story about it's intended meaning. Push through multiple design iterations to develop your vocabulary, use of typography and ability to communicate about the meaning of a new word, phrase or ideology through time, motion and space.

Step 01

Using a single letter form from your word, create a 5 second animation of this letter. What possibilities are there for creating action for this form?

Why did you choose the typeface that you did? Is this the best possible choice to illustrate the meaning of your word with?

Iterate, explore type classificaiton system and what typeface communicates specifically about your word through its form.

Use black letters on white background only.

Animate the letter form by having it create an action.

Create this as one 5 second scene and export it as a GIF.

Begin this exercise with storyboard sketching! Complete typographic studies to determine which type-face is the most appropriate.

Step 02

Using multiple letter forms to create another short composition. Use variation in scale as well as principles of grouping to tell a story about the relationship between the forms. Create engaging compositions explore overlapping, scale, use of margins and frame. Animate the letter forms to tell the story of the meaning of a words through simple animations. Perhaps chose a more common word that describes the meaning of your assigned word?

Final Composition

Use your 2D skills and explore other modes of displaying "typography in space" for this typographic narrative. You began with exercises and studies that incorporated how to use storyboard sketching what did you learn from those studies. Start your final composition with 3 different ideas worked out in the storyboard templates.

Reveal the meaning of a word over a duration of a 30 second video that communicates the intended meaning of the assigned word taken from <u>Christian Leborg's Visual Grammar</u>.

Be prepared to present initial studies and design research on Monday, April 08. Let the assigne readings inform your process and be able to reference ideas from the book in class on Monday.

Including the following: drawn sketches, evidence of completion of Adobe After Effects Tutorials by applying effects to type forms in order to reveal investigation of type and movement. You will also display exploration of sound bytes for your compositions. Work these sound bytes into your ideation.

Present detailed storyboards, Adobe After Effects studies, sound bytes as researched sound elements.

Use black letters on white OR white letters on black background only. For now... we will address color later as our studies develop.

Select from the typefaces from our study topics.
